Page 1 (Splash)

Splash: CU on four 11-year-old children's faces looking forward – Each in muted colored columns.

- ELI Jewish Israeli Blue themed Darker skinned Mizrachi, curly hair, T-shirt.
- JANNAH Muslim Gazan Green themed Wearing a headscarf.
- AMIR Druze Israeli Yellow themed Short straight hair wearing a buttoned shirt.
- LILY Christian Canadian Red themed Long wavy hair wearing a shirt and blouse

A Calendar reads: "October 7th, 2023".

WORD BALLOON (shared by all 4): "Today, my father was killed."

Endnotes 1:

- On the morning of October 7th, 2023, Hamas terrorists launched a hugely successful
 attack into Israel from the Gaza Strip, resulting in massive and indiscriminate murder of
 civilians in the surrounding communities, as well as at the nearby Nova music festival.
- Many people lost family members and friends, as Hamas terrorists live-stream broadcast their atrocities, and in some cases, entire families were slaughtered.

Page 2 (4 Panels)

Panel 1 (wide): Eli rushes into an apartment's bomb shelter as he's pulled by ELI'S MOTHER – Who holds a cell phone – Both look panicked as a TV shows news in the living room through the door with the headline, "MUSIC FESTIVAL ATTACKED".

ELI (caption): "He was Murdered..."

SOUND EFFECT: "RRRRmmmMMMMmmmm" (an alarm).

Panel 2 (diagonal): Lilly, inside a military IDF jeep, sits up and stares out the rear window while the jeep speeds off and out a broken kibbutz gate – 3 soldiers rushing past towards the opposite direction.

LILLY (caption): "Gone ... "

Panel 3 (diagonal): Amir stands at the entrance of his house with his mother, her hand on his shoulder as they watch the street, where many Druze men rush out in uniform – Including Amir's OLDER BROTHER.

Amir (caption): "Never coming back..."

Panel 4 (wide): Jannah and her mother look down from their balcony at the Gazan Street below – Masses gathered to CHEER and SWARM cars carrying Hamas Terrorists and hostages through the throngs.

JANNAH (caption): "A Martyr..."

Endnotes 2:

- Panel 1:
 - Eli and his mother rush for the bomb shelter located in their apartment (a common feature in most modern Israeli homes), as a warning siren sounds, indicating an imminent rocket barrage.
- Panel 2:
 - Lily and her dog are rescued from the carnage by the IDF, who evacuate her to safety.
 The intense fighting in some Kibbutzim lasted days, along with efforts to save trapped civilians.
- Panel 3:
 - As the events of October 7th dawned on the Israeli population, many reservists immediately took the initiative to report for duty before getting called up, and many also headed to the zones of combat independently to try to offer what help they could.
- Panel 4:
 - 251 hostages, mostly civilians, were kidnapped into the Gaza Strip some with injuries, and some already dead, in order to be used as bargaining chips by Hamas. Among those taken were women, children, and even babies, as well as Jews, non-Jews, Israelis, and foreigners.

Page 3 (Splash)

Splash: Split into four corners, each has a CU of the eyes of one of the children – Top left Eli – Top right Lilly – Bottom left Amir – Bottom right Jannah – And in the center, a joint thought balloon.

THOUGHT BALLOON (shared by all 4): "...Why?"

Page 4 (Splash)

Splash: Split into four corners, each has a CU of the children, now with their eyes closed and their heads lowered.

WORDS: "I remember a year ago..."

Page 5 (4 panels)

Panel 1 (square): A football is kicked by a sneakered foot along grass.

AMIR'S FATHER (OP): "We missed you in the unit."

Panel 2 (square): The ball SOARS through the air.

ELI'S FATHER (OP): "With your aim, you don't miss anything."

Panel 3 (wide): Across the panel is a grassy park, Amir having kicked the football at a makeshift goal, which Eli dives successfully in front of to defend against the shot – Their FATHERS on a bench watching – ELI'S FATHER sat smoking a cigarette while AMIR'S FATHER leans against the bench from behind.

AMIR'S FATHER: "Seems neither does your son."

ELI: "Got it!"

AMIR: "Woah! Nice!"

ELI'S FATHER: "I'm tired... tired of always fighting. Sometimes I think I should just take my family and leave."

CAPTION: "October 7th, 2022 - Tel Aviv"

Panel 4 (wide): The same scene reframed with Eli and Amir on the left, as Amir offers a hand to Eli, helping him up, while their parents are framed on the right – Eli's Father flicking his cigarette away as he stands, while Amir's Father rests a hand on his shoulder.

ELI: "I wish you didn't live so far away."

AMIR: "You have to come to the restaurant. Druze cooking is the best."

ELI'S FATHER: "I don't know... I'm... I'm just -"

AMIR'S FATHER: "Tired... We all are. But, habibi, this is home."

Endnotes 5:

- Eli and Amir play football (soccer) in Tel Aviv's 'Park Hayarkon' as their fathers discuss their reserve duties. Certain units of the IDF are called up regularly until members reach a certain age.
- Habibi means Friend in Arabic.
- The Druze are a small religious and ethnic minority originating in the Middle East, with communities primarily in Israel, Lebanon, and Syria. Known for their strong sense of community and secrecy about their faith, the Druze emphasize loyalty to the state in which they live and serve prominently in the Israeli military, as well as integrating into public life as part of their commitment to national unity. Page 6 (3 panels)

Panel 1 (wide): A wide overhead view from the sea encompassing Gaza on the right, with its stunning coastline, bustling streets, mosques, and farms approaching the center of the panel and the BORDER WALL with its military defenses separating it from Israel... as to the of left this – Farms and fields lead to beautiful Israeli kibbutzim, with their cottages and communities.

CAPTION: "October 7th, 2022 – Israel (left of panel) Gaza (right of panel)"

Panel 2 (square): Lily and LILY'S FATHER approach a humble kibbutz cottage as they wheel suitcases. Lily wears large, over-ear headphones, and Lily's Father is wearing a Toronto Maple leafs hat, gesturing to Lily's headphones.

LILY'S FATHER: "Lily. Off, please. We're home."

Panel 3 (square): Jannah and JANNAH'S FATHER approach an apartment building carrying shopping – Jannah wearing her headscarf, while Jannah's Father wears a Celtic fc hat and glances at his phone.

JANNAH'S FATHER: "Jannah. Keep your hair covered at home. We have company."

Endnotes:

- Panel 1: In 2005, Israel unilaterally and completely withdrew all presence from Gaza in a peace effort, but instead of peace, Hamas took control of the region with their founding charter stating their objective is to "kill the Jews".
 - In 1967, during the Six-Day-War, Gaza came under Israeli control when they captured the territory from Egypt. As a former part of Egypt, and sharing a border with the country, some Gazans still hold Egyptian citizenship.
 - After the Six-Day-War, there were attempts to return Gaza to Egypt, however these were refused.
- Panel 1: Many Israeli 'kibbutzim' communities surround Gaza, some mere minutes away.
- Panel 3: According to Islamic law, women who are no longer children must practice modesty by covering their hair in public, as well as when they are in the presence of non-close family members - especially men.

Page 7 (3 Panels)

Panel 1 (wide): Eli, Amir, and their fathers sit at a table eating with a HUMMUS BOWL at the center – The hummus bowl bleeds down into the bottom two panels with everyone sharing the table and hummus bowl, as each panel has its own version of the table itself, while the hummus bowl remains identical.

ELI: "Nothing beats hummus."

AMIR: "Umm... what about fūl?"

ELI "On a falafel?"

AMIR: "Obviously. On everything."

Panel 2 (tall): Jannah and JANNAH'S MOTHER are in the kitchen preparing tea and baklava – Jannah's Father and a Hamas Terrorist sit with their backs to them behind them at the table, as Jannah sneaks a bite of baklava.

JANNAH'S MOTHER: "Jannah, Show respect. You should be proud to have a man like him in our home."

JANNAH: "I know who he is... but I don't -"

JANNAH'S MOTHER 2: "Shhh! Behave!"

JANNAH 2 (thought balloon): "Or what?"

Panel 3 (tall): Lily turns away from the table with her arms crossed – Her father stood to her right gesturing at the table and hummus.

LILY'S FATHER: "Lily... please eat the hummus. At least try it."

LILY: "Eww. Gross..."

Endnotes 7:

- Despite differences, hummus unites the many different cultures, ethnicities, and religions in the Middle East.
- This page symbolically places all the characters around the same table, even though
 physically they are in different locations, with Eli and Amir at a restaurant, while Jannah
 is at her home, and Lily is in hers.

Page 8 (5 panels)

Panel 1 (wide): In a parking lot, Eli and Amir's Father's cars are parked next to one another, Amir's Father's car is a compact SUV parked head first, while Eli's Father's car is a smaller city car parked trunk first... Eli's Father has the driver's door opened and he reaches inside for a wrapped bottle, while Amir's Father leans against his car glancing over at their children, approaching while hunched over Eli's phone.

AMIR: "And it's coming out next year?"

ELI: "Looks cool, right? We have to play it."

Panel 2 (wide): Eli's Father hands Amir's Father the wrapped bottle, as Eli and Amir enter their respective cars from the outside doors and wave goodbye to one another.

ELI: "Bye, Amir!"

AMIR'S FATHER: "Opa! You know you really didn't -"

ELI'S FATHER: "Tss... I didn't anything. It's for me so I don't go thirsty next time I see you."

AMIR: "Come visit, Eli!"

Panel 3 (square): Eli's Father grins with a wink as Amir's Father smiles – Their hands clasped.

Panel 4 (square): Car doors close.

Panel 5 (square): Eli and Amir watch each other through car windows as the cars drive off – Eli waving goodbye while Amir sticks his tongue out.

Endnotes 8:

- While traditionally Druze do not consume alcohol, just as traditionally Hindus do not consume beef and Catholics fast during Lent, over time these norms have shifted.

Page 9 (2 panels)

Panel 1 (square): Jannah lays down the tray of tea and baklava on the table for her father and the Hamas Terrorist, who has a SCAR on his face, and he eyes her with a grin.

SCARRED HAMMAS TERRORIST: "Shukran. How old are you?"

JANNAH: "I'm -"

JANNAH'S FATHER: "She's 11. Go to your room, Jannah."

Panel 2 (square): Jannah moves away from the men and towards a doorway, slightly glancing back to listen as they speak.

SCARRED HAMMAS TERRORIST: "But Allah blessed you with a son to fight the Jews, yes?"

JANNAH'S FATHER: "Only... a small boy still, but Inshallah, already a warrior."

Endnotes 9:

 Panel 1: The man visiting Jannah's house is a member of Hamas, who control Gaza, and which is designated as a terrorist organization. There have not been elections in Gaza since 2006.

- Close to 25% of all girls in Gaza are married before their 18th birthday, with the mean age around 16, as reported by the Palestinian Central Bureau of Statistics (PCBS), and the UNFPA.

Page 10 (3 panels)

Panel 1 (wide): Lily sits upside-down on a sofa with headphones on listening to music... her father sitting at an armchair with an open bible, as he glances over at her from behind a pair of glasses.

MUSIC: "JJJ...I didn't choose this town... I dream of getting out... JJJ"

Panel 2 (square): Lily lowers one side of her headphones to hear her father speaking from OP.

LILY'S FATHER (op): "Taylor Swift?"

MUSIC: "JJJ... You're on your own kid, you always have been...JJJ"

LILY: "Mhmm..."

Panel 3 (square): Lily heads out of frame, half her body already gone, as her headphones are lowered by her side and her father watches her stride off, sadness in his eyes.

LILY (op): "I hate it here..."

Page 11 (4 panels)

Panel 1 (wide): Amir and his father are driving along a highway – Amir sits in the backseat behind the passenger seat reading a comic book... his father adjusting the rear-view mirror.

AMIR'S FATHER: "Had fun?"

AMIR: "Yeah."

AMIR'S FATHER: "Who knows? Maybe one day you and Eli will serve together too."

Panel 2 (wide): Amir rests his head against his headrest and stares out the window as the car drives... his eyes drifting closed, the gift from Eli's Father on the passenger seat, as Amir's Father drives with a satisfied smile on his face.

AMIR (thought balloon): "I hope we won't need soldiers by then..."

Panel 3 (tall): Eli sits at the sofa playing a soldier video game on the TV with a games console – Eli's Father on the balcony smoking a cigarette and watching him through the glass, tired...

Panel 4 (tall): Eli lies on his back in bed holding an imaginary gun while looking at the ceiling with a grin.

ELI: "...bang..."

Endnotes 14:

 Mandatory national service is a requirement for all Israeli citizens, (3 years for men and 2 years for women), once they reach 18. This can take the form of military service or other specialized national services, such as in education or agriculture.

Page 12 (4 panels)

Panel 1 (wide): Jannah tucks her LITTLE BROTHER, 3, into bed – Glancing through an open door to see her father helping the Hamas Terrorist conceal a crate inside a secret compartment under their carpet.

OP: "Lift it on 3... 1...2...3..."

Panel 2 (wide): Jannah writes in her journal at night.

JANNAH (journal entry): "Only here, in these words, do I feel I am my true self. Alone and without judging ears or eyes... I don't want to be scared, but I am... of the Israelis... of what we're becoming. Why do we fight like this? And who really are our enemies?"

Panel 3 (wide): Lily sits at her piano with an empty notebook – Her hand outstretched to a key as she presses down on a single note.

SOUND EFFECT: "\$..... \$..... \$...... "

Panel 4 (wide): Lily rests on her side in bed, her eyes open and staring out.

LILY (caption): "Maybe I'll be inspired tomorrow..."

Endnotes 12:

- Panel ½: Many homes and public spaces in Gaza are used by Hamas as places to store
 weapons and launch attacks from, as well as for entrances and exits into massive and
 intricate underground tunnels.
 - To not cooperate with Hamas' activities in Gaza is a potentially life threatening decision, which could result in imprisonment, punishment, or execution.

Page 13 (3 panels)

Panel 1 (top left 3rd): Eli's Father sits at a large work desk in his office with a mixing board, high quality speakers, and several screens. There are music posters and some shots of him DJ-ing on the wall, along with a photo of an army unit with everyone masked. Eli holds a record album, and Eli's Father looks over.

ELI: "You actually used this in a mix before? The cover is funny."

ELI'S FATHER: "Sometimes 'funny' is exactly what you need."

Panel 2 (middle diagonal third): Same location, closer – Eli looks towards the photo of the army unit – Eli's Father pointing at one of the figures.

ELI: "Even in war?"

ELI'S FATHER: "Especially. See him? That's Yossi."

ELI'S FATHER 2: "He was... he was always making everyone laugh."

ELI: "And you saved his life."

Panel 3 (bottom right 3rd): Back to a wider frame, Eli's Father has taken the photo off the wall and looks down at it, Eli also looking – The record album cover he was holding now held to his side and showing the 'funny' cover image of an egg with a mustache and a tiny top hat.

ELI'S FATHER: "Right... a real hero..."

ELI (thought balloon): "Abba always does the right thing."

Endnotes 13:

 The photo they are referencing depicts Eli's father along with members of his military unit, which would also include Amir's father.

Page 14 (3 panels)

Panel 1 (wide): Jannah and her father are on their knees on the carpet in the living room having completed prayers – Jannah's hair is uncovered – It's long and tied back as she looks down to the floor while Jannah's Father looks out the balcony window.

JANNAH'S FATHER: "You're old enough to know many things, but not everything."

JANNAH: "I understand enough. I know what -"

JANNAH'S FATHER 2: "This isn't a game, Jannah. My job is to protect you. From more than just the Jews. Do you –"

JANNAH 2: "I thought your job was to teach science at school?"

Panel 2 (wide): Jannah and her father are on the balcony, looking out over Gaza... and far beyond in the distance, the border wall can be seen.

JANNAH'S FATHER: "Your mind... Maybe one day you'll go to university. Would you like that?"

JANNAH: "I can fight for our people. Why don't... You always say that -"

JANNAH'S FATHER 2: "Enough with your tongue! Our struggle comes in many forms. Some must battle with guns and bombs, while others with their heads... and hearts. It is a fortune to be able to choose."

Panel 3 (wide): Still on the balcony, Jannah has turned round to face the house again, looking inside at her younger brother, seen playing on the carpet with blocks while Jannah's Father continues to look out into the distance, his head now lowered.

JANNAH: "Baba... why did you let them put that crate under the carpet? ... Baba?"

JANNAH'S FATHER: "We do what we must... Put your headscarf on when you're outside. You're no longer a child."

Endnotes:

- Panel 1: Religious Muslims are meant to get on their knees and pray 5 times a day while facing in the direction of Mecca, their holiest religious site, located in Saudi Arabia.
- Panel 3: Hamas crates, such as the one placed underneath the carpet, would likely contain weapons and/or explosives and ammunition.

Page 15 (3 panels)

Panel 1 (wide): Amir and his father hike up a steep mountain trail surrounded by rocks and trees – Amir struggling.

AMIR'S FATHER: "A little further, Amir, you can do it."

AMIR (thought balloon): "It's... too... hard..."

CAPTION: "Northern Israel"

Panel 2 (wide): Reaching a crest and vantage point – Amir's Father looks out, taking in the view while Amir drains a water bottle – The view is towards the North and the Golan heights.

AMIR'S FATHER: "Look at that... such a beautiful country. Our country."

AMIR (thought balloon): "I... can't go further."

AMIR'S FATHER 2: "There. That's where my unit crossed into Lebanon... And there's Syria."

AMIR (thought balloon 2): "...does he even notice?"

Panel 3 (wide): Amir and his father sit on the ground to the left of the panel looking out into the distant view on the right – Which shows the Northern Golan region, as Amir's Father points.

AMIR'S FATHER: "Near Majdal Shams, where your uncle lives, is what's called the shouting hill. It's -"

AMIR: "I know. The Druze on either side of the border yell at one another."

AMIR'S FATHER 2: "They speak... right. There's an Israeli movie about it..."

AMIR 2: "Do you... think the Druze will ever have a country?"

AMIR'S FATHER 3: "Amir... We already do. Here in Israel. And there, and there... and wherever the Druze are is their home. This is our strength. Yours too."

Endnotes 15:

- Panel 1: There are numerous hiking trails across Israel, many located in the mountainous northern region.
- Panel 2: Amir's father's reference to his unit crossing into Lebanon refers to the 2nd Lebanon war
 in 2006, fought between Israel and Hezbollah, an internationally recognized terrorist organization
 and proxy of the Iranian Ayatollahs.
 - Hezbollah systematically took control of Lebanon, becoming the de-facto decision makers and rulers there, but their capability took a serious blow as a result of the 2nd Lebanon war... however they subsequently built up their presence once again after the end of hostilities.

Page 16 (3 panels)

Panel 1 (top left 3rd): Lily and her father feed a horse apples from across a wooden fence near a stables on the kibbutz.

LILY: "I miss home."

LILY'S FATHER: "Yup... This is definitely not a Moose. Nor a beaver. But henceforth... I dub thee... *Mountie.*"

Panel 2 (middle 3rd): Lily sits on the ground away from the fence as a small dog sniffs at the ground and approaches... while behind her, Lily's Father pets 'Mountie" the horse by the fence and looks over.

LILY: "I'm serious. I don't like it here."

LILY'S FATHER: "Yet..."

LILY 2: "Ever."

LILY'S FATHER 2: "Can't rush nature, Lily. Everything happens in its own time. Otherwise... butterflies would never hatch from cocoons and flowers would never bloom."

Panel 3: (bottom right 3rd) Closer on Lily as the dog nestles up to her and licks her face, Lily unable to resist smiling, as her father approaches from behind and kneels next to her.

LILY: "I miss my friends."

LILY'S FATHER: "Seems you just made a new one..."

LILY'S FATHER 2: "Look, I know this isn't easy, but remember that every obstacle is an opportunity to show our character and strength... Pancakes?"

LILY 2: "Only if you let me put LOTS of maple syrup."

LILY'S FATHER 3: "Deal, kiddo."

Endnotes 16:

- Many kibbutzim focus on certain agricultural industries or types of production, and contain many green spaces and animals.
- It is common for volunteers to come from around the world to work and live on kibbutzim, as well as to experience the lifestyle there.
- Among the kibbutzim near Gaza, they are known for their volunteer work in aiding Gazans with attaining work permits to industries in Israel, as well as in assisting in access to Israeli hospitals and services.

Splash: A blue tinted page with words handwritten across the center.

Page 18 (2 panels)

Panel 1 (tall): Eli sits on his bed on the lower part of the panel, looking up at his wall, where he imagines himself a soldier in uniform, (still a kid), as he's stood saluting and wearing an eye patch like Moshe Dayan – His though balloon running up the wall next to his imagination.

ELI (thought balloon): "I hope I can be as brave as Abba when I'm older. First, I'll become a famous General. Then maybe go into politics. I could be Prime Minister."

Panel 2 (tall): Jannah sits on the sofa at the top of the panel writing in her journal – The written words forming a journal entry balloon below her in the living room over the beautiful Islamic style geometric carpet with the hidden crate below.

JANNAH (journal entry): "Would Palestinians ever elect a woman to lead them? Could it be me? If I go to university and study hard... I could fight our enemies with my mind... Like Baba said, maybe there are lots of different ways... I don't know... I feel trapped. With enemies everywhere."

Endnotes:

 - In contrast, senior Hamas figures, (many of whom are billionaires and multi millionaires) largely insulate themselves from shortages. Many reside abroad notably in Qatar or Turkey, and Hamas-run institutions in Gaza keep private diesel generators, solar arrays, and uninterruptible power supplies to ensure continuous electricity for leadership offices and VIP residences, even when many Gazans go without power.

- Antisemitism's origins are deeply varied and complex, tracing back to pre-Christian ethnic prejudices in Ancient Greece and Rome, evolving into Christian religious anti-Judaism in late antiquity and the Middle Ages, taking political and economic forms during Enlightenment Europe, and crystallizing as racial antisemitism in the 19th and 20th centuries.
 - Throughout these eras, Jews were repeatedly scapegoated (finding a group of people to blame for trouble), first as ethnic "others," then as theological villains, and later as economic conspirators or racial outsiders, especially during periods of social crisis.
 - Because Jews were a legally and socially marginalized minority in most societies, they had little recourse to challenge these calumnies, making them convenient targets for collective fear, resentment, and the projection of blame.
- Anti-Semitism has long been described as the "canary in the coal mine" of societal health, with its rise often heralding wider breakdowns in tolerance and the rule of law.
 - The idiom itself comes from 19th- and early-20th-century mining practice: canaries—being highly sensitive to carbon monoxide and other toxic gases—were taken underground as living detectors. By 1911 British regulations even required two caged birds per shift; if they fell ill or died, miners knew to evacuate before the air became lethal

- Panel 3: Zionism is the belief that Jews have the right to self determination in their ancestral homeland of Israel, where Jews have had a presence
 - The earliest verifiable mention of "Israel" comes from the Merneptah Stele, an Egyptian victory inscription dated ca. 1208 BCE, (over 3 thousand years ago) in which Pharaoh Merneptah records that "Israel is laid waste", in reference to a people called Israel in Canaan. A later artifact is the Tel Dan Stele (ca. 870–750 BCE), which contains the first known inscriptional reference to the "House of David," (as in King David of the bible), confirming the existence of a Judean (Jewish) dynasty in the land of Judah.
- Panel 4: Rockets launched at Israel that are not intercepted by the Iron Dome are often not aimed at specific targets, and are fired more generally towards areas, resulting in damage against all manner of targets, including from shrapnel even when rockets are successfully intercepted.
 - In this instance, the rocket is depicted as having struck the stables and having killed Mountie, the horse.
- Panel 4: Lily's father quotes the Christian bible, Luke 23:34.

Panel 1 (upper left): Eli sits hiding by the wall near his open door – His Older sister sat beside him holding his hand, as through the door – His father and mother can be seen arguing.

- Since 2023, anti-semitism surged dramatically worldwide, including in the U.S., where incidents rose by 140% in 2023 - the highest on record - while the U.K. saw over 4,100 incidents, more than doubling from the previous year.
- Canada reported 5,791 antisemitic incidents in 2023, more than double the 2,769 incidents in 2022, a 109% increase, and accounting for 19% of all hate crimes, even though Jews make up less than 1% of the population. By early 2024, data showed a further 670% rise in incidents.
- France saw incidents nearly quadruple from 436 in 2022 to 1,676 in 2023, with around 1,570 reported in early 2024 alone, and approximately 57% of all religiously motivated hate crimes in 2024 were antisemitic
- Globally, antisemitic acts increased by 107% in 2024, and with Israel as the world's only Jewish state, many Jews legitimately question where they can live safely amid rising hostility.
